WHY IT'S NEEDED

Volunteer Training Offered to Screen for Memory Awareness

Do you, or does anyone you know, forget names, have trouble balancing the checkbook, or keep asking the same questions over and over? Do you worry that one of these symptoms might mean Alzheimer's Disease?

If so, the Alzheimer's Society of Washington, which provided the information below, suggests that you consider a Memory Awareness Screening as a first step towards finding out if you have Alzheimer's or a related dementia, or another condition causing memory loss.

Memory screening can let you know

that you are okay.

It is not used to diagnose a particular illness and does not replace consultation with a qualified physician. But it can indicate that you might benefit from further testing.

Memory can be affected by several actors, including nutritional deficiencies, pression, stress, lack of sleep, and vascular problems. Some conditions are reversible, especially with early diagnosis.

Early recognition of mild cognitive impairment--mild cognitive loss that may develop into dementia--provides a chance for health care professionals to treat this condition and possibly slow decline in memory and other functions.

For irreversible illnesses, such as Alzheimer's, available and emerging medical treatment may slow the

progression of symptoms.

Screenings are safe and take less than 15 minutes. The volunteer screener may suggest that you follow up with a complete checkup by your doctor or other health professional.

Local Training

On Orcas, Stan Williams, M.D., has offered to train volunteers to do Alzheimer's screening. If you would like to participate in the training, which will take place in late January or early February, call Jan, 2677.



"Or I tell them I was in charge of recruitment and training for a string of brothels, called Busy Bodies."

The truth is, as truth often is, more accurate but less funny: he was operations director and buyer of wigs for a group of department stores, including Dayton's in Minneapolis and Hudson's in Detroit.

Ilse's career has been equally successful: she ran a pricey women's dress department, and later got her license and sold real estate in Detroit and Dearborn,

Michigan. All along, she maintained musical and art skills that were transmitted to their two children, Tom and Teresa.

While finances prevented Gene and Ilse from "higher" educations, they made sure that their two children were college graduates. Tom and his wife live in San Francisco; their daughter, Teresa Chocano, is administrator of the Orcas Montessori School.

Eugene Arthur Herz and the former Ilse Hamburger met on a tennis court in upper Manhattan in 1941. She was 22; he was 25. A pair of crossed rackets still graces their living room wall.

Born in the part of eastern Germany that now is part of Poland, Ilse at 18 came to the US in 1938, the first member of her family to arrive. Her mother, grandmother, and two brothers also escaped, but her father, who had gotten them out of the horrific place that Germany was for Jews, returned there and died in the Holocaust.

One of her earliest jobs was as a nanny for a politically-connected family. One Christmas, she put on a puppet show for the children, and the only adult there was the then-Governor of New York: Herbert H. Lehman. During World War II, she worked as a darkroom developer and printer, and later took a drafting class and found a job as a machine tool designer.

Gene, a New York native, was reared in the Bronx and Manhattan. His mother grew up in Vienna. His father, who emigrated from eastern Europe in 1900, lived past his ninetyninth birthday.

Due to the diabetes which has plagued him all his life, Gene had a military draft deferment during the war, and started to develop his interests in retailing.

When the war was over, and women were "the last to hire, the first to fire," Ilse and two friends made fancy winter headwear, for which Gene did the marketing. "I was now in the millinery business. I had connections," he said.

Soon Ilse became pregnant with their son Tom, and they moved to a New York ourb. A few years later, Teresa was born. Ilse, by now a housewife, joined a volunteer organization and drove into New York City with her guitar. She taught inner-city kindergarten youngsters with singalongs, folk and Hebrew music.

At Tom and Teresa's nursery school, a woman taught recorders to the preschoolers. Later, the woman gave recorder lessons in the Herz home. Tom went on to study piano, guitar, cello and voice, and has sung with the Bach Choir in San

Francisco. Teresa studied recorder, piano (and piano tuning), violin, viola, and flute. "My father had a musical ear that the children and I inherited," said Gene. "He became interested in music while living in New York, and often went to the Metropolitan Opera, where, for 50 cents, he could hear Caruso. When he became successful [as an employment agent], he became such an opera afficionado that he would invite relatives to recitals at the Met."

The Herz family moved where the good jobs were for them, first to Florida, and later to Detroit. The late Rosalie and John Chantiny had lived a few doors away in downtown Detroit, Gene found upon meeting Rosalie a few years ago.

"When our closest friend and neighbor moved to a nursing home, we realized

that we needed to make some decisions about being near family," he noted.

Their daughter, Teresa, found them their present house, in a sunny meadow near Eastsound. The comfortable home is full of art: weavings by Teresa, needlepoint and handweaving by Ilse, paintings by her brothers, his brother, family photographs of several generations on both sides, grandchildren's paintings, and Gene's Found Art.

He makes something of whatever comes his way. One long shelf in their home is filled with clear glass bowls containing hundreds - perhaps thousands - of colored

caps off the syringes that a diabetic must use to give daily injections.

His most recent projects have involved what he calls Rubber Band Found Art. He brought in his first pieces a couple of years ago, before a Holiday Fair. He collects the bands in a number of colors and varying widths, also accepting unusual rubber bands from others, and encases bottles, jars, Band-Aid cans-you name it-so as to give these objects entirely different textures. He made several such ornaments for the Senior Center tree this Christmas, using small medicine vials.

How do these eastern and midwestern transplants find Orcas?

"There's family here," beams Gene, not only meaning his own family. "When I walk with Ilse [as they do near their home every day, weather permitting], people wave and stop and schmooze. I have had a positive experience with everybody I've met here.

"One of my fondest experiences is riding the senior van with Pearl Muse—

awesome! She looks like she's out of a fashion magazine.

"I ask her, 'How are you?' and she says, 'I'm here!'" We're happy that you're here too, Gene and Ilse! JKT Orcas Senior Signal



## Advisory Committee Elects Officers, Delegates



## Dogs + Pots + Care = Light-Hearted Folks

Brought together by mutual regard for their dogs, Trudy and Wally Erwin light-heartedly combine career, community and caring.

She makes the pottery, teaches 17 students currently, and plays piano by ear ("everything in the key of F") before Senior Lunch most Tuesdays and Fridays.

"He does the family chores. He does it all. I help him when we change the bed. He also reclaims clay for me and fixes the kilns," says **Trudy**, who conceived the Giving Trees in our front lobby.

Wally was born in Powell, Wyoming and raised with relatives in North Dakota after his mother died. He served with the former U.S. Army Air Corps in World War II, in New Guinea, Okinawa and other Pacific points.

He became a chemist, and retired from the Lawrence Berkeley Lab on the University of California campus when they came home to Orcas permanently in 1985.

Born in Oneida, South Dakota, Trudy came to the Northwest In 1933 with her parents, the late Clinton and Julia Crandall.

World War II interrupted **Trudy**'s studies at the University of Washington: she became an aviation machinist's mate in the Navy, and repaired biplanes near Chicago. She wanted to learn to fly then, but waited until her daughters were grown 20 years later, to solo.

After the war, she returned to UW, he to University of California at Berkeley, and both married others. Their children all live on Orcas full or part-time now: Wally's son Michael works at Country Corner; her daughters Diane (summers here, winters in Federal Way) and Sydney live within a mile of their pottery, The Right Place. Sydney runs Orcas Island Pottery, purchased by her grandmother.

"I played in the mud outdoors as a kid. Mom (Julia Crandall) was a writer and happiest when my brothers and I were outside," Trudy noted.

Julia, widowed for two years, decided to make pots in 1952 when the late Joe and Marclay Sherman decided to sell

the pottery they had established at West Beach in 1945.

"They wanted \$15,000 for the place and we didn't have the money. It was still for sale the next year. Mom made an offer of half the amount and they took it," she said.

The pottery was only open in the summer then. Trudy had taken pottery classes at UW, and taught her mother how make their wares. "Julia was good at pouring glaze into the molds, doing the firing, and got so she could make pottery on a wheel."

Some of her work is in the window of the little house in back of the present Orcas Island Pottery, not far from the new enterprise that **Trudy** and **Wally** purchased in 1977.

To back-track a little, in the mid-sixties Trudy and her former husband and two daughters had moved from Orcas to Berkeley, where she started a popular pottery, The Mug Shop (1965-85). While she was away, her mother hired other potters.

"When we came back, Sydney was working with Mom and they had a good thing going, so Wally and I decided to get our own pottery going. So we bought our present place, the old Wright place, from a speculator who bought it after C.R. and Genevieve Wright died."

Wally and Trudy, he widowed, she divorced, had met at a Berkeley folk dance.

"One of my colleagues at the University noticed I was moping, so she took me to the folk dance," Wally recalled.





### Experienced Teacher Offers Affordable Computer Training

April brings a unique one-time chance to "learn computers" from an expert systems engineer who has taught widely. Whatever your level, there is a class for you on Wednesdays and Thursdays at the Senior Center.

Francis Hagen, MA in Systems
Engineering through IBM from the
University of California, Irvine, will offer
three six-week classes, starting April 6 and
7, (Wednesdays and Thursdays) in the
Computer Lab. It also will be open five
afternoons a week, 2-4 PM, so that
tudents can practice their new skills.

Francis is equally at home with PCs and MACs. The Senior Center computers include three PCs and an IMac. Four people can be accommodated for each class. The cost: \$40., includes afternoon use of the Computer Lab for two months, after which the monthly cost will be \$10. for lab equipment usage.

"The third session, at 1:30 PM, is for people who know quite a bit, but are stumped at times by simple things that others seem to do readily. These will be one-on-one or group as wanted," Francis said.

But as you all know, transportation is by no means all of what the Senior Center does. Our marvelous building is busy almost all the time, with classes, luncheons, meetings, special events, foot care clinic, and so much more. Just look at the calendar for April in this issue and you can see how busy we are and how integral to so many people's lives the Senior Center has become. And of course, even more vitally, Jan and her colleagues spend a great deal of time assisting individual seniors and their families – working out problems, finding resources, answering questions.

The funds to support all those other activities come from a number of sources: from fees paid by those who take classes; from the county, which supports the staff salaries and pays to maintain its half of the building; from the rental of the Lundeen Room or other spaces to other non-profit groups. But when we've added up all those sources of income, we find that we still need to raise \$15,000 to \$20,000 each and every year to meet the special needs of all our seniors, to keep the lights and heat on, the building cleaned and maintained, the water running, the bookkeeping done, and the gardens planted, mulched, and weeded.

That \$15,000 - \$20,000 can only come from two sources: The proceeds of special

Icebergs, Antarctic Operations, to be Shown

Mike Krieger, an Orcas resident whom the National Science Foundation asked to photograph the largest floating object on our planet, will narrate a slide show of his work in the Lundeen Room at 4

PM April 24.

Last December and January, he was aboard the U.S. Coast Guard icebreaker Polar Star as it broke through nearly 80 miles of ice, some of it nearly eight feet thick, to open a vital channel to our McMurdo base in the Antarctic. Clearing the channel allowed a tanker and helicopter to make the annual voyage to supply the base.

"I was fortunate enough not only to photograph operations on board, but also to use the ship's helicopters to photograph the incredible Antarctic scenery," **Mike** 

said.

His aerial photos include enormous icebergs, including B15A, the largest in the world.

The photos and the story of the syage will constitute a chapter of a work in progress. He is the author of four books on maritime-related subjects. His last, All The Men in The Sea, was published in 2002 by Simon & Schuster's The Free Press, and in 2003 by Pocket Books.





#### SENIOR PROFILE

### Flying + Friendships + Family = Full Life

Mary Lou Clever's friendly self can often be found, on Tuesdays and Fridays, at the Senior Lunch table, southeast corner of the Lundeen Room. Her contributions to the Senior Center, which she would prefer to remain anonymous, shall remain that way. They are substantial.

When many of us hear "Orcas Fly-In"

or "American Legion," we automatically think of Mary Lou. Long-time Orcas, yes! What many people don't know is how much this lady has traveled and how many other interesting places she has lived.

Born in El Paso, Texas, she moved at the age of four with her family to California, where she met her late husband, Les, and graduated in 1940 from Fullerton High School.

"He was a 'Fullerton boy;' his family had been there since the 1890s," she recalled. "Les was one of twins, the first born at Fullerton Hospital."

He went into the Air Force during World War II, while she worked at Douglas Aircraft Company in Long Beach. "I made the holes for the rivets," she recalled.

After the war, he was sent to Puerto Rico with a unit that advised the Air National Guard.

"We spent four lovely years there," she recalled. Les then sought an assignment with a mobile training unit in California so the children could go to school in Fullerton.

After their schooling and early jobs, both sons settled in Washington state. **Dick** is city editor at the Skagit Valley Herald; **Ray**, deputy sheriff on Orcas.

Mary Lou had taken a job as accounts receivable bookkeeper at he Fullerton newspaper. "One day, Les called

and asked if I'd like to move to Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. I said, 'When!'"

So they went to help advise the Ethiopian Air Force (1966-68), met the late Emperor Haile Selassie, and ate a lot of roast lamb. They visited the royal palace ("It had lots of playground equipment for the youngsters").

After Ethiopia, they went to Edwards Air Force Base, then to the Philippines, where Mary Lou began to develop her interest in painting.

When **Les** retired from the Air Force in 1974, they stored their things, bought a motor home, and traveled around the country, coming to Orcas for good in 1979.

With Donna Ballinger, Les and Mary Lou started the Orcas Fly-In twenty years ago. (There had been previous fly-ins, but this was the first comprehensive one.)

"We used to park our motor home out there and stay all week," she recalled.

They purchased, from Cherie Lindholm, four acres on Elwha Rock Road. They started building, living in the motor home by the growing structure.

"While I was cooking dinner one evening, I heard creaks and shrieks, and we saw the ferryboat grounding, right before our eyes," she said. "Everyone headed for the ferry landing.

Les died eight years ago.

A member of Stitch & Gossip, Mary Lou has recently served as its treasurer. (Dorothy Brown was the group's first treasurer.) She also enjoys, in addition to painting, crocheting baby afghans, and cross stitch.

And now the war is over, And I'll soon be on my way, To the land of love and liberty, This time I hope to stay. And as I sit here writing, with one thing in my mind,






According to the review of 47 studies cited above, t'ai chi not only improves balance and heart health, it can also have psychological benefits. Deep breathing is combined with relaxation and postures that flow effortlessly through slow, controlled movements. The result: lowered stress and anxiety levels and improved mood.

The Harvard publication cited above, in the February, 2005 edition, states that t'ai chi's easy, low-impact

exercise routine may provide the right balance for the damaged or failing heart. Other studies have shown that it lowers blood pressure, improves muscle strength and flexibility, and reduces the number of falls among older persons.








Assistance Provided for Eligible Medicare Beneficiaries

A new computerized service will help Medicare beneficiaries of limited income and resources gain access to the extra help available to them through the Medicare Modernization Act of 2003. The service, which will also help them enroll in other health care and prescription drug assistance programs, was developed by the Administration on Aging (AoA) with the assistance of the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) and the National Council on the Aging (NCOA).

"This new resource helps bring together many assistance programs available to seniors who need the most help - and that includes the extra help with drug costs that will soon be available for up to one-third of Medicare beneficiaries through the new Medicare drug benefit," said Mark B. McClellan, M.D., Ph.D., administrator of the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

The new service is a special version of BenefitsCheckUpRx updated for the extra help with Medicare drug coverage. It is available at http://www.BenefitsCheckUp.org/rx, or can be accessed by calling Jan.

BenefitsCheckUpRx will help older adults to take advantage of a subsidy, the comprehensive extra help that covers 95 percent of drug costs on average for people with Medicare who have limited means. Applications are available now. The new service screens beneficiaries for eligibility and then provides a quick link to applying online for the extra help through the Social Security Administration's Web site.

At the same time, it helps seniors and those who work with them apply for other needs-based government programs including the Medicare Savings Programs and other federal, state and private programs that can save seniors money.

Using BenefitsCheckUpRx, people ith Medicare can get help to learn about





and apply for the Medicare low-income subsidy if they are eligible, as well as learn about how to enroll in various programs, including state pharmacy assistance programs, private company patient assistance programs, veterans and TRICARE benefits, Medicaid, Medicare Savings Programs (QMB, SLMB, QI), Supplemental Security Income, and the Medicare-approved drug discount cards which can be obtained through December 2005. The tool is confidential: no one is requir hed to enter their name, address, phone number, or Social Security number until they enroll.

Next year, Medicare beneficiaries who receive full Medicaid benefits or who are enrolled in a Medicare Savings Program (MSP) will automatically receive the extra help with their prescription drug costs. That extra help provides comprehensive drug coverage with no premiums, no deductibles, very low copays, and no gaps in coverage. States have the flexibility in deciding what rules to use when determining eligibility for their Medicare Savings Program beneficiaries, which means that these requirements can vary considerably from state to state. The new BenefitsCheckUpRx incorporates state-specific income and asset eligibility requirements into its on-line screening tool.

The National Council on Aging has also created a special organizational version of Benefits Checkup that will provide training and ongoing customer support for Area Agencies on Aging, State Health Insurance Assistance Programs, State Units on Aging, and other local agencies that serve seniors and persons with disabilities.

Caroline Buchanan to Present Lifelong Drawing, Workshops

We've all heard of lifelong learning; now it's time to learn about lifelong drawing. In a weekend, you'll learn how to do a daily contour drawing, quick gesture drawings--even of figures--and to master a simple approach to perspective.

Caroline Buchanan will teach this workshop Oct. 15-16.

#### Kinship Care Support Program Aims at Grandparents

A program aimed at grandparents or other relatives taking care of a child or children, the Kinship Care Support Program (KCSP) provides short-term services to kinship caregivers who are in emergency situations.

Examples of the type of services available through KCSP include: first/last month's rent deposit, school clothes, housing, transitional counseling, legal fees related to uncontested custody cases, furniture, and utility costs.

The provider for services in San Juan County is Whatcom Opportunity Council, 360-734-5121,ext 344, Gail de Hoog. The agency takes referrals, does the eligibility screening, determines need, and coordinates service provision and vouchers.

Income of the kinship caregiver, who must be living with the children they are taking care of, must be below \$23,736/year for a household of two.



Profile--Ebba Brophy

#### Friends, Talent & Humor Combine to Make the Good Occur

"Everything good in life happens through friends," says **Ebba Brophy**, artist and art teacher extraordinaire. True, and her life shows that talent and a sense of humor make the positive stuff happen as well.

Born on a Denmark farm, the red-haired, green-eyed **Ebba** was "always drawing, from early childhood. A classmate and I used to make paper dolls and clothes for them." She has made her own Christmas cards since she was little.

"My own school had a very good art teacher who once in a while let me do my own thing instead of drawing circles and squares," she said.

Later, in middle school and high school, she took classes in figure drawing. Figure drawing? "That was in Denmark, where anything goes," she quipped.

The Germans invaded Denmark when she was 16 and in her last year of high school. "Our English teacher told us, 'Today when you go home from school, you will see German soldiers. You will treat them as bad air.'"

Little by little things got worse in previously-peaceful Denmark. "We couldn't bike to our wonderful beaches because they were full of German guns and concrete bunkers. Much of the Danish population had little direct abuse because they regarded us as Aryans, but they persecuted Jews."

For example: "Old King Christian used to ride his horse in Copenhagen early every day and greet people such as the delivery boy from the bakery. Then the Germans said all Jews should wear the Star of David. The next day, the King wore a star, and then most Danes did. The Germans made the King stay home after that."

When the war ended, **Ebba** landed a job with the British Embassy in Copenhagen. There, she started painting. "I took china painting from an old red-haired lady," she recalls.

After a few years, she went to England with a a girlfriend whose brother and wife needed a nanny for their three children. The wife was a model in London; the husband was a Squadron Commander in the RAF. "They came to the country on weekends and we went to beaches and dances. It was an easy job during the week; on weekends we put the mutton in the oven and all went to the pub, with lemonade for the kids."

Then she returned to Denmark with her sister, and another friend found her a job at the

American Consulate in Copenhagen. "This was a great time, lots of parties and dates. The Consul had Danish teachers every day and dated Danish girls, including me!"

Meanwhile, some of her mother's American relatives came to visit, and invited her to stay with them in Abington, MA. "I decided to get a work permit, just in case."

For a while, she helped her Aunt Else in her restaurant, and enjoyed Cape Cod.

"Then I decided to find out what a working girl does in America." So she got a job in a Boston insurance company and commuted by train from Abington.

"I found out that in America you have to wear a new outfit to work every day, in contrast to Denmark where you have one tailor-made suit and different blouses."

Her aunt decided to sell the restaurant and move to Oakland, CA.

"The two of us took off. I only had my driver's license for two weeks. After coming down a steep hill in Pennsylvania, she stopped the car and said, 'I'm not driving any more. You'll have to drive us to California.' I did. It took ten days."

Aunt Else spent winters in California, summers back in Abington. Ebba found a job at Kaiser Industries in Oakland, and met Ed Brophy, a gunner in the Coast Guard, through—naturally—a friend.

"He was stationed with my friend's husband. He was so full of jokes, life, enthusiasm! I was 32 and held out as long as I could. I was 'I will, I won't,' so we finally did. We married in 1957."

In marrying Ed, Ebba became stepmother to his two boys, whose mother lived in Seattle.

In 1959, Ed and Ebba's son Chris was born. "He and Scott and Ed Jr. are all good friends today.

They go fishing together," she noted.

Ed's Coast Guard career took them to live in Louisiana, Maryland, and California before he retired to the Olympic Peninsula. She had taught some painting classes in New Orleans and now expanded her knowledge by taking tole painting, rosmaling and design classes at the junior college, and at a Norwegian lodge in Stampede Pass.

She taught rosmaling and tole in Port Angeles, where she turned their garage into a studio. She and her family cross-country skied and hiked. "He got involved in Scouting and climbed Mount Olympus. We had a good time there."

How did they come to Orcas? Ed had taken a group from the Port Angeles Senior Center to the San Juans in the 1980s and wanted me to see it. I fell in love with Deer Harbor." She lives there again today, after a short interlude on the mainland before his death in 2001.

Here, she took classes from the late Jean Putnam, with Jane Kempe, Mary Lohman, Jan Wells, and others. "We had several exhibits, one at Orcas Center. Up to that time, I didn't like my watercolors. Jean was a wonderful inspiration."

Ebba "never got around to" selling her paintings in stores, but friends purchased quite a few and she sold at the old Holiday Fair at the school and at the new one. In November, she will have a booth devoted to her hand-painted Christmas ornaments at the Holiday Festival of the Arts here November 26.

### Beware: Peak Season for Deer-Vehicle Collisions

They say love is blind. Now there's statistical proof, at least if you're a deer. According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS), fall--deer breeding and migration season--ranks as the peak time for deer-vehicle collisions.

Simply put, as the antlered Romeos search for mates, they're not thinking much about cars. Wildlife experts estimate that one-half to two-thirds of deer-car encounters occur from October through December.

It's a nationwide problem that's getting bigger as deer populations soar in many suburban and semi-rural areas. More than 1.5 million motorists hit deer each year, according to the IIHS studies. Those crashes kill more than 150 people and cost more than \$1 billion in vehicle damage.

While you can't predict the movements of a deer, you can improve your odds of avoiding a crash:

- (1) Cut your speed, especially around dawn and from sunset to midnight (prime deer activity times). The most effective crash-reduction techniques studied by the IIHS were temporary deer-warning signs, which caught drivers' attention and caused them to reduce their speeds. Compared with similar unsigned areas (or those with permanent signs), deer strikes were cut in half.
- (2) Use high beam headlights, which illuminate the eyes of a deer near the roadway.
- (3) If you see one deer, expect more. Deer often travel in groups of two or three. They may dart out to join another that has just crossed the road.
- (4) Don't swerve. You're much more likely to wreck your car and risk injury or death if you swerve to avoid a deer, rather than hit it. Slow down as quickly as possible, stay in your lane, and maintain control.
- (5) Forget deer whistles. Though they've been sold for more than 20 years, deer whistles (which attach to your car and



emit an ultrasonic noise claimed to scare off deer) haven't been shown to cut collisions.

And a final thought: Always buckle up or, if you're a motorcyclist, wear your helmet. In IIHS studies, 60-65 percent of deer-collision fatalities occur among people who are not properly restrained and protected.



Senior Profile

Ruth Boyd Has Many Facets

Ruth ("Rudy") Boyd, who alongside her late husband, became a journeyman electrician practicing on Orcas, also is an accomplished weaver and stamp collector. Recently, she donated some of her lovely mats for a Senior Lunch raffle, and she also gives these to family and friends.

She was born August 1, 1911 in the Boston suburb of Weston. Her mother, Alice, was a physician; her father, George Eliot, was a landscape architect. They had another daughter, Mary, whom Rudy called "Minnie," and who is still "going great guns" in Providence, Rhode Island. Their father, a widower until he met their mother, also included in the family his son from his previous marriage.

"Father loved flowers, and Mother loved vegetable gardens, " noted Rudy, recalling Sunday desserts on their porch, facing woods stretching down to what is now the main street in Weston.

They lived there until she was eight, when both her father and grandfather died. Just before the latter event, her sister and mother had moved to Providence to be near "Grandpa Ballou," whom she recalls as "a kind, thoughtful man who went out of his way to put himself at your level."

She was raised in Providence, spending summers on her family's Rhode Island coastal farm with "big white work horses and a lovely beach."

Later, as her mother traveled frequently, Rudy went to boarding school where "I was the youngest person by far." She learned to weave there, making a green mat which she still has. She started nurse's training at Providence Hospital but thought she might like pre-med instead, and came out to California to attend Occidental College.

There, she met her first husband, Ray (the late Lester Clever's older brother). "We had so little money, we married C.O.D. (cash on delivery) in Tiajuana," she joked. Nevertheless, she

was able to help put him through college with a small inheritance from her grandfather.

In 1933, she and Ray drove across country from California to Providence for the birth of their son, Lawrence ("Larry"). They also had two girls, Mary Annette and Nancy. (The latter and her husband recently moved to Anacortes.)

They lived in Pacific Beach, CA, where **Rudy** had a photography job, taking pictures of classes at Scripps Hospital, and where **Ray** learned to fly.

She first came to Orcas with her second husband, **Bill Boyd**, in the early 1960s, and stayed at the old Orcas Hotel, where "There was a terrific thunderstorm in the night, and a window blew out."

Later, they returned, stayed in an Orcas house on stilts over the water, and went house-hunting with the late Rich Exton. They found a wonderful cabin with a stone fireplace, atop a hill overlooking the Sound, in 1964.

"Rich showed us the cabin, which was built by a ski instructor who was living in Spain. He said he didn't think it was for sale, but we offered a \$1,000 down payment which he forwarded. We wound up paying \$6,000 for the place."

They added two bedrooms and bathrooms to the cabin, and in the process found themselves becoming electricians. "The previous electrician had died in a car accident, so we decided to take the exams and become journeymen," she explained.

A life-long philatelist, Rudy grew her stamp collection greatly at this time.

"I used to get all the First Day covers. When Clyde Brown was Postmaster, he'd put the notices into my box," she noted.

The Boyds also decided they wanted a boat. The Guzzwell twins, John and James (whose father, John, is the ocean sailor, boat builder and writer), obliged, and constructed a small tugboat which they named "Alice E." after Rudy's mother. They enjoyed many boat races until Bill's death early in 1998.

Rudy still maintains her Orcas home, enjoying her friends, her stamps, and her weaving. What a privilege, to get to know this wonderful woman!



Liger, Myers: Walkin' On Air

Pilots' New Career:

#### Music From the Heart

Two Orcas pilots, both cancer survivors with more than 10,000 hours' flying time between them, are flying in a new direction: Music From the Heart.

That's the name of John Liger's and Ron Myers' musical enterprise. They recently released their first CD, "Walkin' on Air," featuring piano and vocals by both men. You can listen to it online: their Website is niceneasymusicco.com.

They perform upwards of 80 shows a year throughout the Pacific Northwest, and have generously shared their talent with the Senior Center and Orcas Center.

The latter place is where the duo met, on the set of Music Man, about a decade ago.

"I always listened as **Ron** played," **John** said. "After the show was over, I said: 'I really like what you do on the piano. I'd like to see if there's any chemistry in what we do together.' He said, 'Come on over.'"

"We did 'Whale of A Show,'" Ron recalls.. "John wowed the audience with 'Old Man River.' He'd come out on the stage pushing a broom. Ken Speck, who was MC, said John had to sing, dance, or tell a story.

"John replied that he couldn't dance or tell a story. Then he ambled over to me at the piano and said: 'Do you know that rolling river water person's song?' I said I didn't, but I'd try. After an intro of 'Jesus Loves Me,' I got into it and it brought down the house."

Neither man is shy about promoting either the new CD or the fact that they have survived prostate cancer and other folks can, too.

"The more people know you can survive it, the better off everyone is," **Ron** said. "When you're first diagnosed, it's scary. The pros know how to do things with it. Men should get the PSA test every year."

**Ron'**s earliest memory of music was at age 6, when he started piano lessons.

"Between ages 6 and 10, I had to practice half an hour, twice a day. Mother used to sit next to the piano to make sure I practiced what I was supposed to. Couldn't go out to play until practice was completed. It was the greatest legacy she could have given me."

In high school (in Vancouver, WA), he played sousaphone and sax in the school band. After a year of college, he joined the Air Force where "I stayed with music as much as I could, although my career was not in the music part." He flew airplanes for 31 years, did a little musical moonlighting on the side, and retired as a full colonel.

He and his wife, **Jo**, have three grown children: **Terry**, a daughter in Tucson; **Tammy**, in Winston-Salem, NC, and **Ron**, in Austin, Texas.

"When my wife and I first came here, I worked in real estate four years, and escaped in 1995 when I told her, 'If it doesn't have anything to do with music, I'm not doing it.'"

He also taught music until a few years ago, when he dropped it to keep up with Music From the Heart.

John's earliest memory of music is at age 3, standing on a sidewalk in Monrovia, CA, his home town, singing 'Home on the Range.' His first instrument, at age 4, was harmonica, with a group of friends. His mother, who played piano, insisted he take lessons.

"After 2-3 months, the piano teacher got us together and said, 'I'm wasting your time. This child will never learn to play piano.'

"Anybody who tells a person that you can never do something is my enemy," **John** says today. "My father said the way to get me to do something was to say, 'You can't do it.'"

He recalls that one of the reasons for his lack of early teacher's approval was that he didn't like the way the exercises sounded. "I'd do it once or twice. Then I'd want to do it better. I only found this was called 'improvisation' when I was 12 or 13 years old."

John, who has never been without a piano or a workshop, played trombone in his high school band in Monrovia, CA, "and got into the same kind of trouble, because I loved to improvise."

He sang in a college choir his first year, and later went into the Navy, winning his wings at Pensacola. Aboard one of the aircraft carriers he started a quartet, which won first place in the Seventh Fleet.

Most of his flying time was night missions in bad weather. After five years, he left the Navy, and went into plastics, including boat building and personal watercraft. A friend who had 4,000 records, turned him on to jazz by introducing him to the music of **Dave Brubeck**, when **John** found that the great improviser and **Richard Wagner**, the composer, had similar chord changes.

In Seattle, a mentor set up an interview for him at The Embers at Alki Beach, where the **Dave Holden** Five was playing in 1965. **Dave** sent him to the noted musician, **Overton Berry**, with whom **John** worked for a year.

He has three boys and one girl by a previous marriage: Cynthia, who lives in Prescott, WA; Brad, Everett; Scott, in Shoreline; and Kevin, Port Orchard. John has a long-time companion in Jean Wellington.

He came to Orcas in 1975 because he "was running five businesses and wanted to slow down." When he moved here, he kept one plastic fabrication business and sold the others.

"Ron gave me grand advice about improvising," said John. "'Be sure it's recognizable, then do your thing.'"

"I say, 'let it be known that this guy can make anything you want out of plastic,' smiled Ron. "Through ten years, John and I have been and are excellent friends."

"I think that friendship has blossomed the way it has because we're able to make this kind of music," John noted.


